### Mayor's Message



The 2018/19 Annual Business Plan and Budget has been developed to reflect our Community Plan, which communicates our vision for Charles Sturt as a leading and liveable City.

This year, the aim of Council is investing in our community and providing quality services while keeping rates as low as possible.

Over the next 12 months we will see the delivery of a number of key projects that will benefit Charles Sturt for years to come, including the completion of Stage 2 Port Road drainage, a revitalised St Clair Recreation Centre Precinct, a rebuilt West Beach Rock Wall, and the replacement of street lights with more energy efficient LED lighting. A highlight will be working with the community to finalise a vision for a new Community Hub at West Lakes.

Our budget for 2018/19 includes \$2.16m for additional annual operating initiatives such as economic development programs to support businesses, school holiday sports program and greening the City projects. The capital works program will see an investment of \$67.4m into roads and footpaths, traffic management initiatives, playground renewals, and upgrades of local sporting clubs.

The rate rise for the next financial year is the lowest in many years and, with an average increase of 1.4%, is below CPI. We continue to strive for a responsible and careful budget, and remain focused on maintaining a surplus financial position. We recognise the financial pressures residents and businesses are experiencing, and are committed to providing a high level of service to our community whilst remaining fiscally responsible.

As you read through the Annual Business Plan and Budget Summary brochure, and see the year in review, I encourage all of you to consider the range and diversity of quality services, activities and infrastructure available to you as a resident of the City of Charles Sturt.

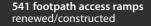

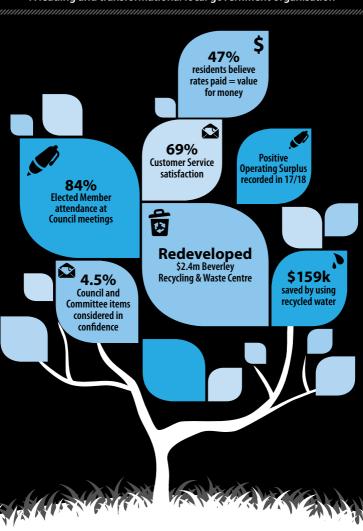

### Project 18/19 Summary

\$240k to construct a specialised changing facility for people with disabilities at Henley Square.





\$400k to reinvigorate and illuminate historic Hindmarsh, Charles Sturt's eastern gateway.

\$200k for the construction of raingardens to cleanse and improve stormwater quality.





\$1.8m redevelopment of Gleneagles Reserve Clubrooms.

Council will spend \$67.4 million in expenditure on capital projects in 18/19 and \$2.16 million on annual operating initiatives. This is in addition to funds allocated to Council's core operating business.

\$5m to roll-out energy efficient LED public and street lighting across Charles Sturt over three years



\$7m over two years to create a combined, state-ofthe-art Library and Community Centre hub at West Lakes.

\$55k to introduce solar powered compacting waste bins in Rowden Town Square



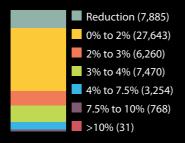


\$1.5m over two years to redevelop MJ McInerney Reserve, West Croydon.

### Rates at a Glance

#### Affordable rates

The typical residential rate increase across the City is 1.8%.



For the typical residential ratepayer paying \$1,330 p.a (\$3.64 per day) this is an additional \$0.46 cents per week or \$23.74 p.a.

#### **How Rates are Calculated**

Rates are a property tax where the amount each ratepayer contributes is based on their relative property values.

As rates levied are a system of taxation the rates paid may not directly relate to the services used. The Council determines services and infrastructure it will provide as laid down in the budget and then levies the amount of rates it needs to provide those services and infrastructure after allowing for other revenue sources.



\*\* At Charles Sturt we have a minimum rate which ensures all ratepayers contribute towards the provision of basic services at a reasonable level. In 2018/19 the minimum will increase from \$1,060 to \$1,071 for 35% of ratepayers (1.04% increase or an extra \$11 per annum).

To determine the rate in the dollar and amount each ratepayer contributes Charles Sturt purchases valuations from the State Valuation office. If you do not agree with the Valuer General's valuation of your property contact the State Valuation Office within 60 days of receiving your annual notice by phone 1300 653 345 or email lsgobjections@sa.gov.au

### Natural Resources Management (NRM) Levy

Council collects a regional NRM Levy on all rateable properties on behalf of your regional NRM Board. This money collected is not retained by the Council, nor does the Council determine how the revenue is spent.

In 2018/19 the increase in NRM levy is 7.2%.

### **Rate Relief Options**

As Council rates are a property tax that does not take a ratepayers financial circumstances into account the City of Charles Sturt analyses the impact of the rates distribution and offers eligible residents rate relief such as:



An automatic cap of 12.5% for residential ratepayers.

Rates will be capped at 1.9% for Pensioners and Self-Funded Retirees who were levied the minimum rate in 2017/18 (\$1,060) and who received the capping rebate, and who have again been levied the minimum rate this year 2018/19 of \$1,071.



If you are rated vacant land and you are building a home you intend to live in for at least one year over 2018/19 you may be eligible for a Residential Construction Rebate. Applications must be received before 30 June 2019



Ratepayers who hold a seniors card will be eligible to postpone any amount in excess of \$500. Interest will accrue on postponed balances.



Community organisations occupying land for health and community services, religious purposes and educational institutions may be eligible to a rebate varying from 25% to 100%.



Any ratepayer who does not meet targeted relief options but who can demonstrate specific hardship can contact Council and a tailored payment plan can be arranged.

### **Rates Payment Options**

Council provide a number of payment options. You can also request to receive your notices electronically by registering for BPAYVIEW 

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Please refer to your rates notice for further details.

Rates can be paid in full by 1 September or in 4 quarterly instalments due 1 September, 1 December, 1 March and 1 June.

Under the Local Government Act 1999, rates not paid by the due date are automatically charged fines and penalty interest.
